Skirts that are acceptable for school



Guidance for skirts:

- Skirts must be plain black and sit smartly on the waist.
- Skirts to be either just above or below the knee.
- Denim, Cord, Canvas and Lycra garments are not acceptable.
- Mini skirts or skirts with high slit are not allowed.
- The style must be appropriate for a range of school activities i.e. not tight or fitted.

Please note: we understand that different students have different body shapes and sizes; if you are unable to obtain a skirt which meets our guidelines, then trousers should be worn.

Please can I remind you of our rules regarding school uniform:

Trousers (boys and girls): Trousers must be tailored black school trousers; no denim, no skinny trousers or leggings and no jean-type trousers with studs.

Skirts: No more than 10cm / 4 inches above the knee; no denim or Lycra.

Shoes: Plain black shoes; no trainers, sports shoes, sandals or boots.

Socks/Tights : Must be black ankle or knee length. No natural tights or coloured socks.

No jewellery (other than a wristwatch) to be worn in school and no piercings.

No makeup at all.

Please be aware that clothing sold in the 'school uniform' section of a store is not necessarily in line with our uniform policy. The final decision regarding the suitability of an item of clothing within our rules rests with the Headteacher. None of these rules are new, however a small minority of students are still wearing clothing that is not within our guidelines. I am sure that all parents and carers would want us to maintain high expectations and high standards and I would like to thank all those who ensure that their children always come to school wearing correct uniform.

School uniform remains non-negotiable and I would much rather staff are spending time discussing with students their work and their progress in lessons than using their time having to deal with non-uniform clothing; to this end we have tried to make guidance as clear as possible.
