Close contacts are anyone in contact with a confirmed case during the infectious period, in the following circumstances:  a. Household contact.  b. Direct contact:  • Face to face contact within one metre for any duration;  • Skin to skin contact;  • Someone the case coughed on;  • Any contact within one metre for more than one minute.  c. Proximity contact:  • Within one to two metres on one or more occasions during a single day for a total duration of more than 15 minutes; or  • Travelling in a car or other small vehicle or close to the case on a bus, train, plane.

Low	Where harm is unlikely or seldom to occur and/or minor injury could result e.g. cuts, bruises, strain	No action or low priority action
