On Monday 25th and Tuesday 26th September, our KS2 pupils will be taking part in some STEAM workshops, led by the Institute for Imagination in London. The focus of these link with previous projects we have undertaken around sustainability – Save, Make, Reinvent.

What is Save, Make, Reinvent?

A fun and engaging way to introduce sustainability into the classroom. Through the circular economy we look at home we can take used materials that we have in the home and school, and empower children to apply their imagination to Save, Make and Reinvent someone's waste into another person's treasure.

Accelerated Reader at Home

Accelerated Reader is a computer program designed to encourage and improve reading, measure growth of the individual reader and to provide quality reading for all. It helps teachers to manage and monitor children's independent reading practice. Your child picks a book at his/her own level and reads it at his/her own pace. When finished, your child takes a short quiz on the computer – passing the quiz is an indication that your child has understood what has been read.

Once your child has finished reading a book, they must log into Renaissance Learning via our direct link below. All pupils must follow this exact link to correctly access the school's domain.

Dougie Mac Cake Donations


We're holding our Dougie Mac cake sale on Thursday 28th September. Pupils can bring in cakes of any sort to donate towards the cause and to raise money.

Spanish Lessons

Since the start of the academic year, pupils in KS3 have been learning Spanish in their weekly language lessons. The pupils have so far responded positively and have been incredibly enthusiastic, embracing the challenge of speaking a new language. The rationale behind this change is to increase pupil interest and engagement in language learning. Lessons are planned with real world relevance in mind and with spoken language at their heart. Speaking Spanish also presents less barriers to learning than those encountered in other languages meaning that activities can be easily adapted to accommodate for both support and challenge. This change to our curriculum offer gives our pupils the opportunity to develop a love for language learning by building on the progress made in KS2 and by making more natural and relatable links to other cultures, allowing comparisons to be made with their own experiences. So far this year, we have explored examples of Spanish culture from Spain and around the world. We have also started learning and using simple classroom language. Throughout the autumn term, pupils will continue to learn the basics of speaking Spanish, introducing themselves and holding simple, meaningful conversations.
